Well Run, Mack

Running! Mack's mind focused on running. Mack Connor had entered the first marathon race in Victoria conducted on October 9th, 1909. The course was from Frankston to Wesley College in Melbourne. Everyone in Geelong and the Melbourne's running fraternity knew him as "Mack", but officially, he was always Adrian Ambrose Connor.

In preparation for the event, Mack used Geelong Guild Presbyterian Harrier's last run of their season to train for the event. He remembered that final day of competition where he came in third behind club mates Long and Batty in the two-mile race at Geelong Racecourse. Two miles was too short for Mack. This was just the beginning of his training. He kept running for another twenty miles before the day was done. Two cyclists accompanied him and said he showed no signs of fatigue. Despite a heavy head wind for part of the run, and running with nobody to pace him, Mack covered the training distance in two hours and thirty-six minutes.

On the day of the Victorian marathon the atmosphere among spectators was electric. During the run, some spectators had accompanied the runners on bicycles. A huge crowd had gathered at the finish line at the Domain when the runners arrived. It was a hot day, with a strong, northerly wind. First to cross the line was A.R. Symes from New South Wales and Mack was second, and the first Victorian runner home. His time was a three hours, five minutes and forty-two seconds. Mack recalled that evening at the Geelong Railway Station when he stepped off the train from Melbourne to be greeted by seventy Guild Club members. They carried him shoulder high from the station, placed him into a motor car and drove him to the Guild Hall Clubrooms in Myer Street, where another one hundred members gathered to celebrate his achievement. At that time, for the twenty-one year old, Vice-captain of the Geelong Presbyterian Guild Harriers, this was

the pinnacle of his athletic success. The *Bulletin* newspaper called him the "Human Kangaroo from Geelong".

Visions of the past were interrupted by pain Mack felt in his chest. Each deep, controlled inhalation and exhalation was now forced and consciously taken. His chest wound was inflicted by a German bullet or shrapnel, at the Battle of Fleurbaix on the Western Front, in northern France. His chest wounds had not responded to treatment. Painkillers had given him brief respite, but the seeping, pustulating wound was still there. Infected lesions still festered and drew on his reserves of remaining strength, leaving him in a feverish condition. Opiate based painkillers had worked, but the sophisticated days of penicillin and anti-biotics had not arrived. Mack's marathon skills of grit, determination courage and endurance, that propelled him to so much success, were needed now in his personal battle for survival.

In a delirium, his mind snapped back to happier days when deep breaths were associated with exhilarating athletic success. Numerous wins in distance events, especially the marathon, were always associated with the deep, nourishing breath that restored health and strength. Breaths accompanied by the sweet scent of victory and the admiration of crowds of spectators. His first moments of glory.

Mack had been lying on his back for eight long days in the 35th General Hospital in Calais, hoping for recovery. He longed for the times when he could run free in his home town of Geelong, where he was feted and famed for his distance running and respected for his work with the Geelong Presbyterian Guild. How could this have happened? He was only twenty- eight years old, had a bright future and a glorious past.

Mack's mind again wandered back to his marathon success. He was selected to represent Victoria in the New South Wales Marathon Championship, organised by Sydney's Newtown Harriers Club. Mack was a Timber Sorter by trade and not financially strong. He calculated the trip to Sydney would cost ten pounds and too much for him to pay from his salary. Guild President, Mr D.F. Griffiths, made a plea to the Geelong community to raise funds on his behalf to finance the journey. The community responded and Mack was presented with a purse of sovereigns to cover his trip expenses.

Thousands of spectators lined the Sydney course on June 6th, 1910. Again he ran second behind Sime, despite achieving his best time of two hours and fifty-nine minutes. The prize for second place was a trophy worth five pounds and a gold championship medal.

In 1910, athletics was a sport relatively new to the Geelong community. Mack was one of the founding members of the Geelong Guild Presbyterian Harriers in July, 1908 and one of the hardworking Presbyterian Guild members who contributed to the building of the Guild Hall at 33 Myers Street. He was heavily involved, not only in the Athletic section, but also in Bible classes and the Literary and Gymnastic sections. Many Geelong citizens would have seen him compete in the Geelong Football Club home games at the Oval, where the Guild competed in races at half time. In summer, Mack played cricket, not too successfully, and was the founding Secretary of the Newtown and Chilwell Cricket Club in 1910.

Mack's memories drew him back to that fateful day in Geelong on August 7th, 1915 when he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Forces (A.I.F.). It was a day that changed his life. He was "*Taken on Strength*" (added to the unit) into the 22nd Battalion, 8th Reinforcement.

Mack was a peace-loving man who also led Bible studies classes at the Guild Hall. Many who knew him were surprised that he had enlisted. As a strong, committed, practising Presbyterian who abhorred war, it seemed Mack could not sit and let others do *his* patriotic duty in the nation's hour of need.

Mack's life as a Timber sorter seemed a lifetime away. On enlistment, his life was now out of his control and placed in the regimented and calculating hands of commanding officers. He recalled the sequence of events that led to him lying limp and ashen on his bed in the military hospital.

Civilian clothes were exchanged for khaki, woollen fatigues the army provided to new recruits. His first experience of military discipline and training was situated to the rural north of Melbourne at Broadmeadows. From September 25th to November 22nd, 1915 Mack had undertaken training to skill him in ways of modern warfare as an A.I.F. soldier.

The son of George and Elizabeth Connor, born in Ferntree Gully, in 1887 Mack was brother to nine siblings. He was the fourth child born. The Connors had ten children; four girls and six boys. Now Mack was also Private Adrian Ambrose Connor, ID 3496, born into an 'army family' that needed his young, energetic drive to fight for king and country. Mack compulsorily wore metal tags around his neck to prove his new identity. To meet the criteria for this *new life* in the Australian Imperial Forces family, he had to be:

• Aged between 18 and 45 years (he enrolled at 27 years and 9 months);

- Minimum height 5 feet 2 inches (he was 5 feet 9 inches); and
- Chest, 33 inches (fully expanded) (his chest was 34 inches not expanded).

At 9 stone, one pound (58 kilograms), the fair haired, grey eyed young bachelor of fair European complexion was the epitome and wholesome embodiment of the young Australian male.

Dedication toward training, that had once made him the Victorian Marathon Champion in 1909, 1910 and 1911, was redirected and refocused on new skills required to succeed in the acts of war and self preservation.

Mack was not a stranger to team commitment, after all he had been a team member of the inaugural Geelong to Melbourne Relay in November 1908 that delivered a message in a silver tube from the Lord Mayor of Melbourne to the Mayor of Geelong (Alderman W. H. Higgins).

A section of the the Lord Mayor's message on day remarked;

"I commend the spirit in which these clean limbed, clean living lads run, for the runners receive no reward, but they demonstrate that grit and endurance are not incompatible with Godliness and they give every promise of being splendid citizens of our great Australian Commonwealth." Those prophetic words do not fall short in describing the efforts of the new team that Mack had joined.

New recruits arrived and camped at Broadmeadows and in vast, open fields undertook various training roles including learning army rules and strategies, canvas tent erection and Vickers machine gun and rifles practice. All recruits had assembly and marching drills.

Mack's last day of training was November 22nd 1915 and he departed Australia on January 5th, 1916 on the His Majesty's Australian Troop Ship, *HMAT Afric A19*. Eighteen days after

departure, Mark was disembarking on February 23rd, 1916 in Alexandria, Egypt. From there, his regiment was placed on a train to Cairo to journey to Zeitoun - the nearby Australian Imperial Forces'.

Memories of his home, school and athletic endeavours returned and filled his numbed mind with pleasure, pride and joy. He visualised his mother, Elizabeth (*estranged from her husband*), standing at the door of his home of many years in Fairview Avenue, Newtown. Nearby stood the Chilwell State School he attended, but had to leave for work to support his large, impoverished, single parent family. Mack later developed literary skills through the help of the Presbyterian Guild. Over then years, he became a committee man, assistant secretary, treasurer and vice president. Just around the corner in Fenwick Street, stood solid, imposing and noble architecture of the Gordon Technical College where Mack studied a Commerce course at night.

While in Egypt, Mack was transferred to another brigade and battalion: the 15th Brigade of the 58th Battalion. It contained approximately 50% of Gallipoli veterans and reinforcements from the from Australia's 6th Battalion. The Battalion left from Egypt from Alexandria on board the *HT Transylvania* and arrived in Marseille on June 23, 1916. From Marseille they were transferred to train transport, bound for Fleurbaix in the north of France adjacent to the border with Belgium.

Little did Mack know that the 15th Brigade, of the 58th Battalion, of the Australian Imperial Forces 5th Division, would soon engage in Australia's first battle on France's Western Front.

The 5th Division was commanded by Major General James Whiteside McCay. The Division was

Germans to seize their position, and prevent them from despatching reinforcement troops to the

stationed north of the German lines in Fleurbaix. It was intended that they would engage the

major battle to be conducted in the Somme. On the evening of July 19^{th,} at 6pm. the Australians the 61st British division were ordered to attack the German lines to the south at Fromelle. Between the lines lay "No Man's Land" that consisted of an area of land with trenches, large temporary earthen fortifications called 'breastworks', so that defenders could stand behind them and fire at the opposition.

The ground was boggy and small streams flowed through a flat terrain, especially one large 'drain' optimistically named the *Riviere des Laies*. The major goal was to invade the German trenches and capture the high ground called he 'Sugarloaf salient' that was heavily fortified with machine gunners. Commander of the 15th Division was Brigadier General, Harold "Pompey" Elliott. Mack's 15th Brigade was the closest to this objective.

Before the attack, the military launched an artilliary bombardment, but this did not do the damage intended. There was dust and smoke everywhere in "No Man's Land", but the German machine guns kept firing. Australian troops, who peered over their parapet, were encouraged when they saw German 'breastworks' being destroyed.

At 5:45 pm the 15th Division moved into their positions ready for the first assault at 6:00pm. Soldiers were lined up in waves, ready to move forward on command. Nobody knows in which line Mack was positioned. So confident of the effectiveness of the attack was Brigadier General Elliott, that he told his troops they wouldn't find any enemy in their trenches when they arrived. However, German gunfire could still be heard above the sound of the bombardment at 5:50pm. 'Pompey' Elliott was positioned at a place called *Trou Post*, just a few hundred yards behind the British front line.

The attack had began wih the first wave of the 15th Brigade climbing out of their trench and leaping over the parapet while German shrapnel was landing on them. At five minute intervals the new wave of the 15th Brigade would enter the conflict.

- At 6:02 pm the German fire had increased after the bombardment stopped.
- By 6:09, the Australia troops were still well short of the German trenches.
- At 6:30 Elliott had reports the attack was successful, although communications had been lost.
- At 6:40 the news came from observers that A.I.F. troops were not in the enemy trenches, but half way across "No Man's Land".
- By 7:00pm the 15th Brigade was pinned down.
- At 7:18pm Brigadier General Elliott had to change his report to state that the Germans were still in their trenches and that every man who rises is shot down.

Successive waves only managed to get half way across before they were cut down by German machine gun fire. When troops reached that point they saw, to their horror, dead, wounded and dying comrades lay thickly scattered.

The last waves of the 15th Brigade to be deployed were the reserves. They made it two-thirds of he way to the German trenches before they too, were cut down by the German artillery. Just after midnight, the 15th Division's offensive had come to an end. It had completely failed.

At some point in the attack, Mack was struck by a German bullet or schrapnel. An invisible force pushed hard against his chest. Mack's life force was being drain. He would need those 'marathon' skills of endurance, stamina and courage to help him survive. For a short time the shock resulted in unconscious darkness: total silence

"No Man's Land" before the attack is was defined and measured at approximately 600 yards wide. After the attack it was not an area of lineal measurement by yards, feet and inches, but redefined as a deep, cavernous, pool of misery, measured by the depth of courage and human sacrifice. Mack had now added to its dimensions.

Shocked and numbed by 'natural' endorphins that create an angelsic effect and reduce the transmission of pain, Mack was oblivious to the cacophony of battle. He lay unconscious and prostrate, waiting for medical help to arrive as the battle raged around him.

- GONE were the feeble cries to "God" and "mother" from the dying comrades who surrounded him, as well as the wailing of the German horns to stretcher their dead an dying.
- GONE was detritus of battle, mixed with the stench of gunpowder, the sharp odour of urine, uncontrolled faecies and stale mud mixed with human blood; and
- GONE was that taste of fear, when the spine tingles; the heart pounds; the senses sharpen; and the primal responses of flight, fight and freeze entwine to become a combined instinctive reaction.

Help did not arrive immediately, but eventually it did.

When reports of the operation reached the overall commander, General Richard Haking in the morning, he abandoned any further attacks. Many wounded, including Mack Connor, had been left behind. Retrieving the wounded took over three days and nights. Mack was picked up by the 8th Australian Field Ambulance on July 22nd. His 5th Division had suffered terrible losses among the officers and men. This 15th Division lost 5,533 dead, wounded and missing men in one night's fighting! The 58th Battalion lost almost one-third of its strength in the battle.

The evenings of Wednesday, July 19th and Thursday July 20th were not to be forgotten by anyone involved in the tragic scene of carnage.

Stretcher bearers didn't begin their work until late into the evening on July 20th. Mack was evacuated from the field of conflict by the 8th Australian Field Ambulance on Saturday, July 22nd. He was moved first to the 8th Australian Field Ambulance and then to the No. 8 Casualty Clearing Station. Mack's injuries were too severe to be treated at the Clearing Station, so on the same day he was transferred by Ambulance Train to the 35th General Hospital in Calais.

Mack spent the last days of his life being treated in the hospital. Little is known of his treatment and the suffering he endured in those final hours. He was a man whose generousity of spirit, friendly, gregarious nature, dedication to a cause and faith in God, made him much admired by all who knew him and those who had the privilege to call him; "friend".

Adrian Ambrose "Mack" Connor died at 3:30pm on July 30th, 1916 from chest and back wounds received in the Battle of Fleurbaix. Reverend G.V. Dunnett conducted the requium. Mack is buried in British Southern Cemetery, Cailais, France, Plot E, Line 3, Grave 12. He shares that resting place of white, marbled headstones with 720 comrades.

United in life, they fought for in their cause.

United in death, they share their final resting place.

LEST WE FORGET

Mack's race was run. Strength, stamina and endurance exhausted, he was at peace, and with his God.

An Obituary, in the Geelong Advertiser, described his life and contribution to Geelong's society.

"Now Mack has run his race. He ran it patiently, doggedly, this life race in which he was so interested. And the Great Judge or Umpire will write in the book of life against the name of Adrian Connor just three words – WELL RUN MACK."²

After World War I, when the Geelong Presbyterian Guild Harriers continued to compete, their most prized trophy was the A.A.Connor Cup.

GUILD RELAY RUN.

GEELONG TO MELBOURNE.

CONGRATULATORY MAYORAL MESSAGES.

The event which has been foremost in 3'01 the minds of members of the Presbytering Guld for some weeks past-the relay run from Geelong to Meloourne-passed 500 off yesterday, and was even more successful than the most sanguine of the promoters dared to anticipate. Since the suggestion was first made by the president lic of the Guild (Mr. D. F. Griffiths), to the on effect that a message should be conveyed in this novel manner from the new mayor of Geelong to the Lord Mayor of Melbourne, the matter was taken in hand very entinusiastically, and as the idea assumed more definite shape and received assumed more definite snape and solid support from cutside, interest as solid support from cutside, interest as to the result reached a high point. was an undertaking which necessarily to meant a considerable amount of thought lic. on the part of those at the head of the raaffair, and of self-denial and enthusiasm amongst the runners, particularly those who so readily assented when asked to cover the more dreary stretches of the journey. However, the matter was taken up in the best of spirits, and it re-dounds to the credit of all concerned that not a single hitch occurred throughout, this gratifying result being achieved mainly through the efforts of Mr. Griffiths in making such complete arrange-ments along the road to be traversed by the messengers.

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It had been notified that the message would be handed to the first runner at the Geelong Town Hall immediately after the installation of the new mayor (Ald. et W. H. Higgins), and by 12 o'clock a large crowd of interested people gathered in the vicinity to witness the departure of H. Pilley. The latter was photographed by the "News of the Week" photographer as the tube containing the message was handed over by Ald. W. H. Higgins, who was arrayed in his new mayoral robes. In handing the message over, the mayor said, "I desire you and the other runners to deliver this message to the Lord Mayor of Melbourne. With such a beautiful day, I am sure you will bring the run to a speedy and satisfactory termination." The text of the message is as follows:—

These greetings are carried to you on foot by fast runners of the Presbyterian Guild of this town.

I commend the spirit in which these clean limbed, clean living lads run, for the runners receive no reward, but they will demonstrate that grit and endurance are not incompatible with godliness, and they give every promise of being splendid citizens of our great Australian Commonwealth.

At 12.15 p.m. Pilley raced down Gheringhap-street to Mercer-stret, followed by scores of cyclists, and later on by Messrs. Hendy, Leary and Co.'s motorcar, which conveyed Mr. E. E. Hendy, the president of the Guild (Mr. D. F. Griffiths) and one of the secretaries (Mr. W. J. Griffiths). A large number of cyclists went right through with the different runners to Melbourne, where crowds of people had gathered to see the last of the run. Policemen were stationed at each corner, and the last runner, Stanley Evans, had a mounted eccort along Collins-street to the Melbourne Town Hall. The finish of the long run was particularly successful, and there was great cheering as the messenger at 4.50 reached his destination and entered the building for the purpose of landing the tube to C. Durches

handing the tube to Cr. Burston, Lord Mayor of Melbourne. The latter telegraphed the following message in reply to Ald. W. H. Higgins, of Geelong:
"Dear Mr. Mayor,—
"The kind message of good will from yourself and aldermen, councillors and burgesses of the Town of Geelong has been faithfully delivered into my hands through your trusted messeagers. It has given me very great pleasure to cooperate with you in carrying out this very fine effort on the part of the young men of the Presbyterian Guild of Geolong. It is a most commendable effort, worthy of emulation and deserving of every encouragement. I admire very much the spirit in which the movement has been undertaken, and the splendid manner in which it has been carried out. I trust sincerely that our young men will endeavor to develop the manly qualities necessary to success in athletics and healthy mind essential to true manhood, recognising that to cultivate the sound mind and the tound body is a personal duty, a national obligation and a sacred trust. I heartily reciprocate your kindly greetings, and trust that success and prosperity may always attend the sister municipality of Geelong.—James Burston, Lerd Mayor."

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




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Location on the Roll of Honour



The names will be displayed from sunset to sunrise every night, and can be seen from the Memorial's grounds. Each name will be visible for 30 seconds.

This special commemoration runs from 4 August 2014 until 11 November 2018. During this period, the entire set of 62,000 names will be displayed about 30 times.

On 19/20 July 1916, these fields were a battlefield – the battlefield of Fromelles. In the distance at [A], is the village of Fromelles about 2 kilometres to the south-east down the Rue Delvas on the left. Further right, at [B], is Delaporte Farm which lay just behind the German front line. The line moved south-west through the fields and crossed the little Rivière de Layes at [C]. Only the high banks of the Layes [D], running to the south-west, are visible here. Beyond that, at [E], was a well-defended semicircular position called the 'Sugar Loaf'. At 5.45 pm on 19 July 1916, across the road to the far right, men of the 59th and 60th Australian Battalions formed up and started to move out of their lines heading across the fields for the German trenches and the Sugar Loaf. Some had to cross the Layes which ran through no-man's-land. Artillery bombardments had failed to destroy the German positions and between 5.45 and 6 pm the advancing waves of Australians were cut down by enemy machine gun and rifle fire. A supporting attack by the 58th Battalion was also shot to ground with heavy casualties. Other Australian units attacked and captured sections of German trench towards Fromelles village but they were driven out by effective counter-attacks on the morning of 20 July. All told, within 24 hours on 19 and 20 July 1916, the AIF, in its first major action on the Western Front, suffered more than 5,500 casualties in this small area.







In the theatre of war in France and Flanders, the British hospitals were generally located near the coast. They needed to be close to a railway line, in order for casualties to arrive (although some also came by canal barge); they also needed to be near a port where men could be evacuated for longer-term treatment in Britain.

There were two types of Base Hospital, known as Stationary and General Hospitals. They were large facilities, often centred on some pre-war buildings such as seaside hotels. The hospitals grew hugely in number and scale throughout the war. Most of the hospitals moved very rarely until the larger movements of the armies in 1918




Historical Information

In April 1915, No 6 Base Supply Depot was started at Calais to help relieve the pressure on Boulogne and to provide a base nearer to the front than Le Havre or Rouen. The base remained open until the last Commonwealth forces left France in March 1921.

The 30th, 35th and 38th General Hospitals, No 9 British Red Cross Hospital and No 10 Canadian Stationary Hospital were also stationed in the town, providing about 2,500 beds. From May 1915 to March 1918, Commonwealth burials were made in Calais Southern Cemetery. Subsequent interments were made in the new military cemetery at Les Baraques.

The cemetery now contains 721 First World War burials.

Broadmeadows was home to the major army training camp for the Australian Imperial Force.

The land was previously known as Mornington Park. It was a wide field, suitable for military practice, including training for the Light Horse regiments. It is the current location of the Maygar Army Barracks on Camp Road in Broadmeadows.

To reach the camp, soldiers marched from Victoria Barracks in St Kilda Road and headed north up Sydney Road, only resting near Fawkner Cemetery. The camp soon became a popular location for family outings on Sundays.

Soldiers slept in tents and food was basic.

Training was hard, but it did not prepare soldiers for a modern war with machine guns, gas, shells and aeroplanes – technology that did not exist in previous wars.

Some men only completed a few months training before departing on troopships from Port Melbourne.

Once overseas, some soldiers received further training in Egypt.

Broadmeadows was the site of the main camp for the reception and training of recruits for the AIF from Victoria early in the First World War. Broadmeadows had been identified as a possible site for military training in 1913, but no facilities had been established. The camp was established in August 1914 at "Mornington Park", a property loaned to the government by Mr R.G. Wilson. Early on, Broadmeadows was predominantly a tented camp and conditions were quite spartan. These facilities, combined with wet weather and poor drainage resulted in a rapid increase in sickness among recruits in autumn 1915. Public concern, fuelled by sensationalist press coverage, resulted in a decision in May 1915 to reestablish the main Victorian training camp at Seymour, approximately 100 kilometres north of

Melbourne. Broadmeadows Camp remained in use throughout the war, however, with facilities being progressively improved


